
## Rubber Stamping

## Rubber Stamping

#### **Definition**:

Rubber stamps are a device with a rubber printing surface that becomes coated with ink by being pressed on an ink-saturated pad then printing the image onto paper.

LT: I can create a Rubber Stamp landscape with animals, using 5 or more rubber stamps & markers.



- 1. Copy the DEFINITION from this station onto your VOCAB sheet.
- 2. Look through the stamps and practice using them on rough draft/scrap paper.
- 3. To STAMP press stamp onto an INK PAD then press onto the paper.
- 4. To CLEAN the stamp press the stamp several times on a damp paper towel or sponge. ALWAYS clean before returning the stamp or changing INKS.
- 5. Decide how you will arrange the stamps to create a landscape.
- 6. Put a full heading on the BACK of a LONG-sheet of <u>printing</u> paper. (This will be the cover of your "Print Book" later)
- 7. Draw your ground, hills, land and/or water.
- 8. Stamp the plants and animals on your landscape. Color in with markers or colored pencils to complete the look. Store the print in your

## Colograph

#### **Definition:**

Collograph is a print that uses a build-up of applied surfaces, such as glue, cardboard, cloth, sand, etc. it is then inked by hand and printed on paper.

## Collograph

LT: I can create a Collograph PRINT of a dancing/ moving figure with cut out paper and cardboard.

- 1. Copy the DEFINITION from this station onto your VOCAB sheet.
- 2. On rough draft paper, draw some quick figures showing movement, like running, dancing, jumping, flying.
- 3. Cut out pieces of cardboard to show the figure from your BEST drawing. You may also string to show movement in your print.
- 4. Glue the pieces onto a cardboard "Printing Plate" This Should DRY before using it to print with.
- 5. Write your name and date onto 3 sheets of printing paper.
- 6. Roll the INK onto your cardboard "Printing Plate"
- 7. Lay the paper ON TO the cardboard "Printing Plate" carefully rub to transfer the INK.
- 8. Peel off and allow to dry while completing the other prints. When dry, Store the print in your **Print folder.**

## Foam Printing

# Foam Printing

Definition: Foam
Printing is a type of
RELIEF PRINTING in
which ink is applied to
the raised surface of a
plate or block where
the non-image area
has been removed, as
with wood and
linoleum cuts.

LT: I can create a Relief PRINT of my <u>name</u> with zen doodle designs inside the letters.

- 1. Copy the DEFINITION from this station onto your VOCAB sheet.
- 2. On rough draft paper, draw some bubble or graffiti style letters that spell out your name.
- 3. Transfer onto the FOAM Printing Plate. It SHOULD BE BACK-WARDS!!!
- 4. Add in some Zen doodle patterns INSIDE your letters.
- 5. Write your name and date onto 3 sheets of printing paper.
- 6. Roll the INK onto your **FOAM Printing Plate.**
- 7. Lay the paper ON TO the FOAM "Printing Plate" carefully rub to transfer the INK.
- 8. Peel off and allow to dry while completing the other prints.
- 9. When dry, Store the print in your Print folder.

## Mono Printing

# Mono Printing

#### **Definition**:

A Mono-print is an impression made on paper from glass or some equally smooth material to which a paint has been applied.



- 1. Copy the DEFINITION from this station onto your VOCAB sheet.
- 2. Look into the mirror and use paint and a fine tip brush to draw the OUTLINE of your face on the mirror.
- 3. Closing ONE EYE can make it easier to focus on the image.
- 4. Fill in the spaces and shapes with other colors.
- 5. Write your name and date onto 2 sheets of printing paper.
- 6. Lay the paper ON TO the MIRROR "Printing Plate" carefully rub to transfer the PAINT.
- 7. Spritz the back of the paper with water to help the paint transfer IF NEEDED.
- 8. Peel off and allow to dry while completing the other prints. When dry, Store the print in your **Print folder**.

## Silk Screen Printing

# Silk Screen Printing

#### **Definition:**

Serigraphy, also called silk screen printing. A process using a fabric to support a stenciled image. Ink is forced through the mesh with a squeegee to create a print.

LT: I can create an <u>abstract</u>
Serigraphy PRINT using both geometric and organic shapes.

- 1. Copy the DEFINITION from this station onto your VOCAB sheet.
- 2. On card stock paper, draw some geometric and organic shapes.
- 3. Cut out the shapes
- 4. Write your name and date onto 3 sheets of printing paper.
- 5. Place 1 sheet of paper under the screen.
- 6. Arrange the shapes on top of the paper in an artistic composition.
- 7. Lay the silkscreen on top of the paper.
- 8. Spread the INK across the screen.
- 9. Lift Screen and peel away printed paper. Stencils should stay stuck to screen.
- 10. Allow to dry while completing the other prints. ~REPEAT~
- 11. When dry, Store the print in your **Print folder.**

# Block Printing

Definition: Block
Printing is a type of
RELIEF PRINTING
in which ink is applied
to the raised surface
of a plate or block
where the non-image
area has been removed, as with wood

## Block Printing

LT: I can create a Relief Print with a repeating pattern by carving away the negative space in a soft-cut block.

- 1. Copy the DEFINITION from this station onto your VOCAB sheet.
- 2. On rough draft paper, draw up to 3 ideas for a 1 inch pattern.
- 3. Select the best ONE of the 3 designs to Transfer onto the **Soft-Cut Printing Plate**. Rotate and copy the design 4 times on the soft-cut.
- **4.** Carve away the NEGATIVE spaces from the soft-cut.
- 5. Write your name and date onto a sheets of printing paper.
- 6. Roll the INK onto your **Soft-Cut Printing Plate.**
- 7. Stamp it onto the paper carefully rub to transfer the INK.
- 8. Peel off and allow to dry while completing the other prints.
- 9. When dry, Store the print in your **Print folder**.

## Object Printing

LT: I can create a multi-colored, pattern design using found objects as printing stamps.

- 1. Copy the DEFINITION from this station onto your VOCAB sheet.
- 2. Write your name and date onto 1 or 2 sheets of <u>print-ing</u> paper.
- 3. Find between 3-10 different objects that have a RAISED surface that could be used for printing.
- 4. Dip into a paint and stamp onto your paper.
- 5. Repeat shapes and colors to create a pattern.
- 6. When dry, Store the print in your Print folder.
